Lord King of Lothbury, KG, GBE, FBA  
**Europe: Economics or Politics?**

In or out? As the UK prepares to vote on the European question, Lord King looks at the motivations behind one of the most significant constitutional issues to face this island nation in recent times. Will the UK break ties with Europe? Is our future inextricably bound up with our European neighbours? Lord King's timely lecture will look in depth at this vexed question.

Mervyn King was Governor of the Bank of England from 2003 to 2013, and is currently Professor of Economics and Law at New York University and School Professor of Economics at the London School of Economics and Political Science. Lord King was made a life peer in 2013, and appointed a Knight of the Garter by Her Majesty The Queen in 2014.



Shami Chakrabarti  
**On Liberty**

Shami Chakrabarti joined Liberty, the UK's leading civil rights organisation, on 10 September 2001. On 11 September 2001, our world changed. The West's response to 9/11 has moved the question of human rights centre stage. Are our rights under unprecedented pressures? Are our democratic institutions under threat? This evening's lecture looks at the relationship between human rights and a flourishing democracy.

Shami Chakrabarti was until recently Director of the human rights campaign group Liberty. She was a member of the panel of the Leveson Inquiry, a judicial inquiry into phone hacking in the UK. She was awarded a CBE in 2007 and she was one of eight bearers of the Olympic Flag at the opening ceremony of the 2012 London Olympics. *On Liberty* is also the title of her first book.


Dr Rowan Williams:

2016 marks the 400th anniversary of England's greatest playwright. Shakespeare's plays, as relevant as ever today, live through the beauty of their language and through their author's unique grasp of human nature in all its guises. This evening's Annual Lecture will offer an erudite, personal perspective on this most significant of writers.

Dr Rowan Williams was Archbishop of Canterbury from 2002-12. He became Master of

Magdalene College, University of Cambridge in 2013. Dr Williams is a noted poet, translator of poetry and author. Apart from Welsh, he speaks or reads nine other languages.
